The Four Churches of the Pershore Benefice

The Abbey Church of the Holy Cross, Pershore

The Abbey has been a centre for Christian Worship for over 1300 years. It attracts visitors from around the world as it is one of the finest examples of Norman and Early English architecture in the country.

St James the Great, Birlingham

The pretty village church of Birlingham is famous for its blanket of early spring snowdrops. The church itself was rebuilt in 1871 but retains a15th Century tower from an earlier building and the lychgate is formed from the chancel arch of the original 12th Century Norman church.

St Nicholas, Pinvin

A tiny Church set amidst the fields with parts dating from the 11th Century. Originally a chapelry of Pershore Abbey this small ancient village church features a series of stunning wall paintings from the 14th, 15th and 17th Centuries.


St Mary's, Wick

A medieval chapelry of St Andrew's, Pershore, the core of St Mary's is late Norman, with a series of 19th Century restorations. The church features a fine collection of stained glass including work by Kempe and Comper.
