when shown Christ's vibrant unity.

Readings: Genesis 21 v 9-14

Sarah saw the son of Hagar the Egyptian, whom she had borne to Abraham, playing with her son Isaac. So she said to Abraham, "Cast out this slave woman with her son, for this slave woman shall not inherit along with my son Isaac". The matter was very distressing to Abraham on account of his son. But God said to Abraham, "Do not be distressed because of your slave woman; whatever Sarah says to you, do as she tells you, for it is through Isaac that offspring will be named after you. As for the son of the slave woman, I will make a great nation of him also, because he is your offspring". So Abraham rose early in the morning, and took bread and a skin of water, and gave it to Hagar, putting it on her shoulder, along with the child, and sent her away. And she departed, and wandered about in the wilderness of Beer-Sheba.

Pause: Think how this story resonates with things happening today?

Reading: Matthew 2: v13-15

Now after the Wise Men had left, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Get up, take the child and his Mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you, for Herod is about to search for the child to destroy him. Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother by night, and went to Egypt, and remained there until the death of Herod.

Pause – Think how this story relates to the present day refugees.

A Reading from 'The Salt Path' a true story written by Raynor Winn.

Just days after Raynor Winn learned that Moth, her husband of thirty two years, was terminally ill, they lost a court case which results in them losing everything, their home and their livelihood. With little time and very little money they decide, on a whim, to walk and wild camp the 630 miles of the South West coast Path. Hiding under the stairs as the bailiffs are banging on the door and windows, she writes the following.

'I'd met this man when I was eighteen; I was now fifty. We'd rebuilt this ruined farm together, restoring every wall, every stone, growing vegetables and chickens and two children, creating a barn for visitors to share our lives and help pay our bills. And now, when we walked out of that door, it would all be behind us, everything behind us, over, finished, done. We were about to leave the dimly lit, centuries old farmhouse that had held us cocooned for twenty years. When we walked through that door we could never, ever, come back.

Pause for thought – a modern day story of many people.

We now welcome Diane Bennett who will talk to us about and bring us up to date with the wonderful work that Caring Hands in the Vale are doing in this area. There will be a short time for questions afterwards.
