THE COLLECT

Almighty Lord and everlasting God, we beseech you to direct, sanctify and govern both our hearts and bodies in the ways of your laws and the works of your commandments; that through your most mighty protection, both here and ever, we may be preserved in body and soul; through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever **Amen.**

FIRST READING Jeremiah 23.1-6

Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of my pasture! says the Lord. Therefore thus says the Lord, the God of Israel, concerning the shepherds who shepherd my people: It is you who have scattered my flock, and have driven them away, and you have not attended to them. So I will attend to you for your evil doings, says the Lord. Then I myself will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the lands where I have driven them, and I will bring them back to their fold, and they shall be fruitful and multiply. I will raise up shepherds over them who will shepherd them, and they shall not fear any longer, or be dismayed, nor shall any be missing, says the Lord.

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as king and deal wisely, and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. In his days Judah will be saved and Israel will live in safety. And this is the name by which he will be called: 'The Lord is our righteousness.'

SECOND READING Ephesians 2.11-22

A reading from the Letter to the Ephesians.

Remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called 'the uncircumcision' by those who are called 'the circumcision' – a physical circumcision made in the flesh by human hands – remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and

without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us. He has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through it. So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father. So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling-place for God.

THE GOSPEL

Mark 6.30-34, 53-56

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

Glory to you, O Lord.

The apostles returned from their mission. They gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, 'Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.' For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.

When they had crossed over, they came to land at Gennesaret and moored the boat. When they got out of the boat, people at once recognized him, and rushed about that whole region and began to bring the sick on mats to wherever they heard he was. And wherever he went, into villages or cities or farms, they laid the sick in the market-places, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

NEWS FROM THE ABBEY PCC

We met on Tuesday 16 July and here are the key features of the meeting.

Architect: We agreed to appoint Joanna Daykin of Falconer and Gilbert Scott Architects as our Abbey Architect following the resignation of Robert Kilgour. Joanna's first job will be to undertake the five-year review of the Abbey, and she has been approved to do this by the Diocese.

Children and Families Work: We received our regular report from Sam Andrews and the team and were impressed by all the things that they are doing to involve children and families in the life of the Abbey.

Fabric Committee: We had a full report from its chair Judy Dale on all the work done by our Fabric Committee which is as busy as usual. On the advice of our structural engineer, we agreed to start the process of the re-pointing of open joints and any flashing on the North Aisle of the Abbey with the plan that the work should be completed as soon as possible.

We also ratified work on the Abbey boiler to ensure that the boiler room could be kept dry and safe.

Bishop John: We agreed that we would enable gifts for the Bishop to be given at Abbey services so that everybody who wants to can give towards his retirement gift. So, from this week (21 July) for 3 weeks there will be buckets available at the back of church at all our services for your donation. We would also top this up from Abbey funds. We looked at the Diocesan questionnaire on what we would like to see in our new Bishop and agreed that we would each complete our own forms and then hold a meeting to agree a group response from the PCC.

Abbey on the airwaves: We noted that BBC Radio3 would be broadcasting a live Evensong featuring Matthew Martin and the Caius Choir from the Abbey at 3.00pm on Wednesday 25 September

Plans were also being made for us to record a service for use by the Church of England Church online series that will go out in November. More details will follow on this later.
